SAT's TIMETABLE 2024



- Monday 13th May 2024: Spelling, punctuation, and grammar (Grammar/Punctuation Test) – 45 minutes
- Monday 13th May 2024: Spelling, punctuation, and grammar (Spelling Test) 20 minutes
- Tuesday 14th May 2024: Reading Paper (English) 60 minutes
- Wednesday 15th May 2024: Maths Paper 1 (Arithmetic) 30 minutes
- Wednesday 15th May 2024: Maths Paper 2 (Reasoning) 40 minutes
- Thursday 16th May 2024: Maths Paper 3 (Reasoning) 40 minutes

Mathematics

- Children will sit three tests: Paper 1, Paper 2 and Paper 3.
- Paper 1 is for 'Arithmetic' lasting for 30 minutes, covering calculation methods for all operations, including use of fractions, percentages and decimals.
- Questions gradually increase in difficulty. Not all children will be expected to access some of the more difficult questions later in the paper.
- Papers 2 and 3 cover 'Problem Solving and Reasoning', each lasting for 40 minutes.
- Pupils will still require calculation skills but will need to answer questions in context and decide what is required to find a solution.


Paper 1 40 marks Paper 2 35 marks Paper 3 35 marks Total 110

Pass mark ranges from 56 – 61

Breakdown

- About 70% of the marks will be awarded for questions covering Number, place value, approximation, estimation, four operations, fractions, decimals, percentages, ratio, proportion and algebra.
- About 30% of the marks will be awarded for questions covering: measurement, Properties of shapes, direction and position on graphs and maps and statistics.


Large pizzas cost £8.50 each.



Test Scores

- Each pupil's raw test score will be converted into a standardised score, either at, above or below 100.
- It is planned that 100 will always represent the 'national standard'.
- A child who achieves the 'national standard' (a score of 100) will be judged to have demonstrated sufficient knowledge in the areas assessed by the tests.

In July 2024 publication of test results, each pupil will receive:

- A raw score (number of raw marks awarded). /110 previous years
- A scaled score in each tested subject.
- Confirmation of whether or not they attained the national standard.

Over 50% of marks are from topics taught in Y3, Y4 and Y5
So it is possible to pass without understanding of all Y6 topics

How to Help Your Child with Maths

CONTINUE TO REVISE KEY AREAS: 4 operations, fractions, decimals and percentages

- Play maths games including counting in different amounts, forwards and backwards (including the use of fractions and decimals) and times tables games
- Encourage opportunities for telling the time, using timetables or television schedules
- Encourage opportunities for using money; finding amounts or calculating change when shopping
- Identify, weigh or measure quantities and amounts in the kitchen or in recipes, particularly those where conversion of scales used.
- Play games involving numbers or logic, such as dominoes, card games, darts, draughts or chess.

Reading

The Reading Test consists of a single test paper with three unrelated reading texts. (60 minutes)

Reading texts are progressively more difficult but questions may vary. A total of 50 marks are available.

Questions are designed to assess the comprehension and understanding of a child's reading.

Some questions are multiple choice or selected response, others require short answers and some require an extended response or explanation.

During the reading paper, a child's inference and deduction skills are thoroughly tested. They will also be expected to answer questions on authorial choices: explaining why an author has chosen to use particular vocabulary, grammar and text features.

Pass mark ranges from 24-29.

Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling

- A separate test is given on Punctuation, Vocabulary and Grammar
- This test lasts for 45 minutes and requires short answer questions, including some multiple choice.
- A Spelling test is administered containing 20 words, lasting approximately 15 minutes.
- Marks for these two tests are added together to give a total for Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling.

Pass mark was ranges from 35 -39

Helping Your Child with Reading and Writing

- Listening to your child read can take many forms, focus developing an enjoyment and love of reading, enjoy stories together
- **Talk about the story** before, during and afterwards discuss the plot, the characters, their feelings and actions, predict what will happen and encourage your child to have their own opinions, consider the authorial intent.
- Look up definitions of words you could use a dictionary, the internet or an app on a phone or tablet.
- All reading is valuable it doesn't have to be just stories. Reading can involve anything from fiction and non-fiction, poetry, newspapers, magazines, football programmes, TV guides.
- **Practise and learn weekly spelling lists,** encourage opportunities for writing such as letters to family or friends, shopping lists, notes or reminders, stories or poems.
- Write together be a good role model for writing, let your child see you writing!
- Encourage use of a dictionary to check spelling and a thesaurus to find synonyms and expand vocabulary
- Remember that good readers become good writers! Identify good writing features when reading (e.g. vocabulary, sentence structure, punctuation).

How will my child be assessed at the end of KS2?

The children will continue to write as normal as part of their English lessons with on-going moderation between teachers, with other schools and the local authority.

All other subjects (Maths, Reading and Science) will either be assessed and reported as working at the expected standard or working towards the standard.

This will be reported at the end of the school year.

How to Help Your Child during SATs Week

- 10 minute daily practice of Maths targets your child set at Pupil/Parent Conference and any other areas they want to practise.


